

Community Outreach Resource Guide

Defining outreach and engagement. Although often used interchangeably, outreach and engagement are two distinctly different means of connecting your organization with the community. Outreach is defined as one-way communication and implies that those on the receiving end are outsiders. Engagement, on the other hand, is driven by the specific purpose of doing something "with" rather than for someone. Engagement is a shared and mutually beneficial strategy.

So, what is community outreach and engagement as it relates to diversity, equity, and inclusion? It's not much different from your current strategy other than the intentionality of your decisions – who is your audience, how can you authentically interact with them, and how can you create a space of welcome and equitable opportunities.

Effective strategies must be consistent (this is a marathon, not a sprint), continuous (this is really more of an ultra-marathon ..), and multi-faceted. There is no "one size fits all" approach to outreach and engagement. Often the first thing we think of when developing our outreach and engagement plan is how to expand services into new communities or engage more diverse voices, but those only scratch the surface.

Key goals for your community outreach strategies include:

- Engage stakeholders (organization, employees, and clients or customers) genuinely and sincerely with diverse audiences
- Provide multiple opportunities for diverse audiences to share input and actively participate in and guide your work
- Be flexible and fluid, this is not a set-it-and-forget-it strategy
